## The Knight of the Burning Pestle Concept by Marcus Chapman

Cast: 7 actors

I don't plan on assigning any of these roles specific genders actor wise, I will say that Citizen, Ralph, and Tim, regardless of the actor's gender will be portrayed as men.

PROLOGUE - The leader of the group. Kinda dumb but needs people to KNOW that they are in charge.

CITIZEN - A common professor, outspoken and obnoxious know-it-all. Making up for the fact that he doesn't "wear the pants" in his relationship.

WIFE - A flirtatious, dramatic, and controlling woman who is far smarter than anyone gives her credit for.

RALPH - Pansexual icon. Probably sleeping with Wife, definitely WANTS to sleep with Tim

TIM - A member of the original play who becomes Ralph's right hand by default. The sexual tension between the two is outrageous.

DAMSEL - A cast member dressed in everyday modern clothes that gets "pulled into the play" and physically manipulated

BARBAROSSA - A member of the original play, who pretends to be the giant Barbarossa. A furious and

Setting: A Surrealist Allendale, Mi

Key elements of the show:

## 1. Most important: Queer Absurdism.

- a. Because there are no rules when it comes to surrealism, other than break the rules of reality, and this script is clearly queer coded by the editor, I am leaning into this and instead of exploiting it for humor, like the writing may lend itself to, I plan to utilize it as a signature and positive feature to the plot.
- b. Examples: Parentheses are added action by me
  - i. CITIZEN: (referencing Tim helping Ralph with his armor) Peace, fool! let Ralph alone
  - ii. RALPH:... I will be the said knight. Tim shall be my trusty squire and I will be called the Knight of the Burning Pestle. Tim!

RALPH: My beloved squire, I charge you that from henceforth you never call me by any other name but "the right courteous and valiant Knight of the Burning Pestle." My beloved squire Tim, stand out

- iii. RALPH: Come, squire; the sun grows towards his set And we have many more adventures yet. (they embrace)
  - CITIZEN: I do not like this. (breaking them apart) Peace, boys!
- iv. TIM: I go, brave knight.

## 2. Second Element: Audience Interaction

- a. This show already contains metatheatre; there is no doubt that it requires a decent amount of audience interaction. However, I'm adding in a staged audience interaction with a cast member planted in normal clothes that will be reading off note cards.
- b. Examples: Parentheses are added action by me
  - i. CITIZEN: You, let my wife and I have a couple of stools and then begin; and let the man do rare things. (They steal two seats in the front row)
  - ii. TIM: Right courteous and valiant Knight of the Burning Pestle, here is a distressed damsel (grabs DAMSEL from audience)
  - iii. WIFE: Sit you merry all, gentlemen; I'm bold to sit amongst you for my ease (Kicks out two new people)

## 3. Third and final element: Farcical Fight Choreography

- a. This show requires a fantastic amount of playful fight choreography that needs to be absolutely ridiculous. So ridiculous that people can't help but get into it and laugh. So as a general rule, none of the weapons will be prop weapons but things masquerading as such, as though the group of actors just threw them together with what they had.
- b. Examples: Parentheses are added action by me
  - i. They fight. (BARBAROSSA blows up a skinny balloon sword)
  - ii. RALPH: I give thee mercy; but yet shalt thou swear Upon my Burning Pestle, to perform Thy promise utterèd.

BARBAROSSA: I swear and kiss.

Kisses the Pestle. (Ralph's broomstick, between his legs, grows like an erection)
